Col Michael Hopkins Calls into Olmsted Board of Directors Meeting from Outer Space

Members of the Olmsted Foundation Board of Directors were treated to a very special surprise recently when Colonel Mike Hopkins (OSC 03, Parma) called into their 17 March meeting from the International Space Station (ISS) to provide a real time update on his mission in outer space.

Speaking from an altitude of about 220 miles over the Earth, Hopkins discussed the launch, docking at the ISS, and the various missions he and his team have completed since their arrival, including two extended space walks. He also offered some interesting perspectives on international relations in outer space and how it has differed greatly from the rhetoric and actions often observed here on earth. For

example, despite the continuing strain in US-Russian relations, Hopkins said his team and the Russian cosmonauts

aboard the ISS have continued to work and collaborate in a completely cordial and trusting way. In addition to commanding the US mission, Hopkins serves simultaneously as Flight Engineer abord the ISS. "US-Russia tension doesn't exist up here," Hopkins stated, noting that his experiences as an Olmsted Scholar definitely helped prepare him for this time in space.

Ambassador Kristie Kenney complimented Hopkins on his achievements and his contributions to international relations. She also expressed confidence he would continue to find ways to build bridges and connect with America's international partners in outer space.

After about 20 minutes, Hopkins informed Board members he needed to get back to work. However, the brief call highlighted the fact that the ISS is traveling around the world at a velocity of more than 15,000 mph: When the call began, Hopkins was over the Patagonia region of South America; when it ended, he was already passing over Eastern Africa. Hopkins and his crew are scheduled to return to Earth on or about 1 May.

Scholar Promoted to Major General by US Air Force

Congratulations to Brigadier General Leo Kosinski (OSC 00, Tokyo), who has been selected for promotion to the rank of Major General by the US Air Force. Brig Gen Kosinski is presently the Deputy Commander of the Fifth Air Force, and the Director of the Joint Air Component Coordination Element - Japan, Yokota Air Base, Japan. His previous assignment was the Director for Logistics, US Africa Command in Stuttgart, Germany. A US Air Force Academy distinguished graduate, Brigadier General Kosinski received his MBA from Hitotsubashi University in Tokyo, where he studied as an Olmsted Scholar.

Chairman's Corner



Word of mouth advertising by Scholars is probably the most effective way to identify and recruit top performing officers for the Olmsted Scholar Program and encourage/mentor them to complete the sometimes convoluted Service application process. We can't always count on Service sponsoring organizations to publish guidance in time to catch potential applicants, particularly as our target audience is often deployed during the application window. I want to challenge all of our active duty Scholars to identify, recruit, and mentor at least two officers. You have the best perspective, know who the top performers are, and have the greatest

credibility speaking with officers in the target audience. My Olmsted experience began when my first Commanding Officer, Rear Admiral (then Commander) "RAK" Taylor (OSC 67, Grenoble), spoke glowingly of his experience, and pushed me to apply. I was not selected on my first try, but he encouraged me to try again and guided me in what I could do to improve my chances of selection. On my second try, again I missed selection. Although Admiral Taylor had moved on to another assignment, he kept in touch and kept encouraging me to apply. The third time was the charm, and I had a life-changing experience in Bordeaux, France! But it never would have happened if an Olmsted Scholar hadn't pushed me to pursue this dream. You know who we're looking for – top performing operational leaders who have the greatest likelihood of going on to be selected for O -5 command in their respective fields. We have worked with Services to identify the ideal windows for their top performers to complete an Olmsted assignment and remain highly competitive for command. It isn't the same window, perhaps, as when you applied or the same "career sweet spot" that existed when General Olmsted first created this opportunity. But your Board of Directors and Headquarters have the flexibility to work with Services and ensure we target the best people, so don't hold back from helping us identify, encourage, and select future military leaders to benefit from General Olmsted's vision. Find two top officers and get them to apply!

Our Neighbor the Nazi Hunter

Efraim Zuroff was featured Newsweek in 2016.

The night after Jay and I moved into our Jerusalem apartment in late August of 2020, our realtor came over to drop off a few items. We were in quarantine and couldn't leave the house, so the coffee maker she brought was like manna sent from heaven (pun intended).

"You know who your neighbor is right?" she asked.

We both shook our jet-lagged heads.

"He's a local celebrity named Efraim Zuroff. He's a Nazi hunter."

I remember thinking, "A what?" before move-in logistics consumed our lives for the next few weeks.

Fast forward to now—seven months later. Dr. Zuroff has become one of our closest friends. We have a set pizza night nearly every Thursday, and a few nights a week, we'll hear three soft taps on our front door. Efraim comes inside, sits in his designated chair for half an hour and answers all of my hard-hitting questions about Israel and Judaism. It usually goes something like this:

"Do you ever wish you could just eat a bacon cheeseburger?"

"No," said Efraim, who observes a strict kosher diet. "You can't crave something you've never had, right?"

"What's the deal with the burning bush in Exodus? Do you believe that really happened?"

"Whaddaya mean did it really happen? Of course it did, *nu*?" said Efraim, in a thick New York City accent mixed with a little Yiddish flair.

Efraim was born and raised in Brooklyn but made *aliyah* in 1970 at the age of 22. The word "*aliyah*" means "to ascend" in Hebrew and is used to describe the immigration of Jews to Israel from countries

all over the world.

He grew up attending Orthodox Jewish schools where he said, shockingly, nobody really talked about the Holocaust.

"I was named for my grandfather's youngest brother who was a Holocaust victim. He was likely murdered in Lithuania's *Ponar* mass murder site, as were his wife and two sons." said Efraim. "We never spoke about it in our house."

But when Efraim saw a map in the *New York Times* before the start of the 1967 Six Day War in which Israel was surrounded by heavily armed Arab countries, the only word that came to mind was "Holocaust."

"I'll never forget that reaction," Efraim said. "I thought, 'there's going to be another Holocaust.' But why did I think that when I knew virtually nothing about the first one?"

Efraim said he later realized that the answer to this lies within the collective memory that lives within almost all Jews. "The Holocaust is part of your baggage," said Efraim. "It's always there."

Since then, he's made the *shoah* (Hebrew word for Holocaust) and Holocaust education his life's work. Early on in his career, the US Department of Justice's Office of Special Investigations contacted Efraim to help find Nazis who had fled to America.

One of Efraim's assignments over the six years he worked with the DOJ was to try and find the informant who reported that German SS officer Dr. Josef Mengele, also known as the Angel of Death, was arrested and released by the U.S. Army in Vienna in 1946.

"It turned out the story was true," Efraim said. "The US officers didn't know who he was, so they let him go."

Efraim sorted through stacks of microfilm from the International Red Cross's Tracing Center for information. He never found the informant, but he did find thousands of records containing information about Nazis and their immigration destinations.

"The ones that went to America even had an address," said Efraim. "It was a historic moment."

From there, Efraim opened the Simon Wiesenthal Center of Jerusalem, which is part of a global human rights organization focusing on the Holocaust. He has served as the Director and Chief Nazi Hunter there for 35 years.

Efraim has tracked down thousands of Nazi war criminals who fled to evade prosecution, and in 2002 he launched Operation Last Chance, which offers financial rewards for information leading to the prosecution and punishment of Nazis.

These days, as the number of living Nazi war criminals dwindles, Efraim works to combat Holocaust distortion in places like Eastern Europe, while keeping the collective memory of the Holocaust alive.

During one of his first weekly visits, Efraim said "Everyone here in Israel has a story."

I've found that while living next door to Efraim, that statement couldn't be more true.
