Anderson to Speak at DC Area Scholar Assembly



Lt Gen Dagvin Anderson (OSC 00, Brno) will be the featured speaker at this year's DC Area Spring Assembly of Scholars. This year's assembly will be held at the Army Navy Country Club in Arlington, VA on April 18th.

Lt Gen Anderson is the Director for Joint Force Development (J7) on the Joint Staff at the Pentagon. A graduate of Washington University, Anderson holds a Master's degree in International Public Policy from the Nitze School of Advanced International Studies at Johns Hopkins University and he attended Masaryk University in Brno, Czech Republic as an Olmsted Scholar. Anderson is a command pilot with over 3,400 hours in multiple aircraft including 738 combat hours.

The assembly will include a catered lunch, updates from the Foundation staff, and Lt Gen Dagvin Anderson (OSC 00, General Anderson's remarks. All Scholars and spouses in the local area are strongly encouraged to attend this event, and invitations will be sent in March.

Olmsted Foundation Remembers Emo Gardner

Former Olmsted Foundation Director Lt Gen (Ret.) Emo Gardner (OSC 78, Goettingen), USMC, passed away this past October in Hawaii. Lt Gen Gardner made Honolulu, HI his home after retiring from the Marine Corps.

Gardner studied in Goettingen, Germany as an Olmsted Scholar. He served as an Olmsted Foundation Director for over two decades. In 2000-2002 and 2004-2010 he served as an active duty flag officer Director. He later served again on the Board of Directors from 2010-2017 as a retired Lieutenant General.

Following graduation from Duke University in 1973, Gardner commissioned into the Marine Corps and trained as a helicopter pilot. Over his career, he flew a variety of helicopter models including Presidential Marine One. Gardner commanded helicopter squadron HMM-261, leading missions in Operations Sharp Edge (Liberia), Desert Shield and Desert Storm. After the Sept. 11, 2001 attacks,



Gardner managed the US Central Command's joint operations center during operations in Afghanistan. In 2002, he became the Director of Operation (J-3) for US Pacific Command in Hawaii. It was there that he met his wife Vivian.

After retirement, Gardner returned to Hawaii. In addition to his service to the Olmsted Foundation, he also served on the board of directors of the Japan-America Society of Hawaii and the US Army Science Board.


Scholars Participate in SCUSA
